PROTECTING DOMESTIC VIOLENCE VICTIMS

Bill to empower welfare officers to immediately protect victims of violence

UTRAJAYA

OME 1,600 Welfare Department (JKM) officers will be empowered to issue an Emergency Pro-tection Order (EPO) to provide immediate protection to victims of domestic violence.

Women, Family and Communi-ty Development Minister Datuk Seri Rohani Abdul Karim said it was among five reforms included in the Domestic Violence (Amendment) Bill 2017, expected to be tabled for the second and third readings in the Dewan Rakyat at the next

Parliamentary sitting.
Through the amendment, she said, authorised officers would be empowered by the JKM di-rector-general to issue temporary ex parte orders effective for one week to protect domestic violence victims during a state of emergency.
"Currently all JKM officers are

in the midst or have undergone the relevant course. The ministry wants all JKM officers in the field to be well-trained," she said at a briefing session on the Domestic Violence (Amendment) Bill 2017

here yesterday.
She said the EPO would provide protection to domestic violence victims by preventing the perpetrator from hurting the victim, inciting others to commit domestic violence, or from entering a safe place, shelter, residence, joint residence or alternative res-

At present, victims can only obtain interim protection orders (IPO) and protection orders from the court, but many complaints of domestic violence occur on weekends, when they cannot get

such orders immediately due to court not being in session.
